Leverhulme Trust Early Career Fellowship: 2024 scheme

King's College London welcomes expressions of interest from exceptional applicants who wish to apply for a <u>Leverhulme Early Career Fellowship</u> (ECF) with King's College London as their host organisation. The deadline for receipt of expressions of interest is 5pm on the 6th October 2023; see details below.

About the scheme

The Leverhulme Early Career Fellowship scheme is open to candidates who hold either a degree from a UK higher education institution, or a non-permanent role at a UK HEI which begins no later than October 2023. It provides a three-year fellowship in any area supported by the Trust, including the Fellow's salary and up to £6k per annum in research costs. Please note the Trust does not support research into disease, illness and disabilities in humans and animals; nor research intended to inform clinical practice or the development of medical applications.

These fellowships are for early career academics who have not yet held a permanent position in a UK HEI, and who hold a doctorate submitted on or after 22 February 2020 (earlier submission only if the candidate has subsequently had a career break). Those who can demonstrate that their work has been impacted by the pandemic, and who submitted on or after 22 February 2019, are also eligible. Individuals should use the eligibility and person specification guidance in the Leverhulme scheme notes to establish their suitability for the scheme. Applicants are encouraged to think about how and why their proposed programme necessitates a Leverhulme ECF rather than a project grant or alternative postdoctoral fellowship; and why King's College London is an appropriate host for them and their research project.

We welcome EOIs to the following Faculties and disciplinary areas:

<u>The Faculty of Social Science & Public Policy</u>: We welcome applications from across the social sciences (and potentially linking beyond), and/or projects that align with faculty research strategy themes around social justice, fairness, inequalities/inequities. The Faculty expects all applicants to have established a relationship with a proposed mentor and be able to articulate the benefits of undertaking the Fellowship in our Faculty compared to another institution; EOIs which remain speculative on either point will not be supported.

The Dickson Poon School of Law: We welcome applications in areas of legal research including Environmental Law; Transnational Law; Human Rights & Anti-Discrimination Law; Sociolegal and Interdisciplinary Legal Studies; Jurisprudence & Legal Theory; Digital Law; Criminal Law & Criminal Justice; European, International and Comparative Law; Corporate and Commercial Law; Private Law, Medical Ethics and Health Law.

<u>King's Business School</u>: We welcome applications in research including Digitalisation: Reshaping Innovation & Entrepreneurship; Global Business for a Sustainable World; Governance, Risk & Regulation; Rethinking the Future of Work, Public Services & Business; Reducing Social & Economic Inequalities.

Expressions of interest

The significant support of the host institution is a critical component of these fellowships. As such, King's has an internal process for identifying potential applicants to this scheme. - A Case for Support describing the proposed area of interest, ensuring it reflects the areas set out above; the proposed research project; an outline workplan; and reasons for choosing King's as your host institution, including areas of research and individuals whose work complements your proposed project (2-4pp)
- Confirmation of your eligibility, reflecting the Leverhulme's eligibility criteria

Applications must be received by 5pm on 6th October 2023 at the latest. After assessment by KCL, selected candidates will be invited to develop a full application with KCL as their host institution, submitting this to the Leverhulme Trust by the 22nd February 2024.
