Linnea Anderson is the Archivist of the Social Welfare History Archives at the University of Minnesota Libraries. Prior to working at the Social Welfare History Archives, Linnea was assistant archivist and then assistant director of the Columbia University Archives in New York. She helped to plan and establish the first formal archives since Columbia's founding in 1754. She also served as a consultant to archives and historical societies for the New York State

Documentary Heritage Program. Before becoming an archivist, Linnea was a museum educator in New York, NY where she developed and presented programs in New York's historic waterfront district on board the historic 1885 schooner, *Pioneer*.



Alice W. Campbell is the Digital Outreach and Special Projects Librarian at Virginia Commonwealth University Libraries, where she creates online exhibits and manages digital projects. Since 2016, Campbell has served as researcher, editor and project manager for the Social Welfare History Project and its consortial Image Portal, which received the Center for Research Libraries 2018 Primary Source Award for Access. Campbell has enjoyed speaking to a variety of audiences about the SWHP, including the National Association of Social Work Pioneers, the Coalition for Networked

Information Membership, and Museums and the Web.



Jessamy Carlson is a historian and an archivist at The National Archives. She is currently working on the history of the Home Office Research Unit, alongside other projects. Jessamy recently completed her PhD in Sociology at the University of Essex, titled 'Girls will be girls – Approved Schools in England, 1933-1973'. She is Associate Staff at the Centre for Archival and Information Studies at the University of Dundee, and advises a number of academic projects including the ICeM 1921 project at the University of

Cambridge. Jessamy is interested in 20th-century British social welfare history, especially in the juvenile courts and the associated systems and institutions.



Rachel MacGregor is Acting Archives Manager at the Modern Records Centre, University of Warwick, leading a busy team delivering an archive service of internationally significant collections to researchers from across the globe. Her substantive role is Digital Preservation Officer where she leads on digital preservation strategy and developing workflows for born digital collections. She has worked in archives for over 25 years, with physical archive collections and more recently focussing on the management and preservation of digital archives in Higher Education. She has a strong

background in outreach and engagement and advocates for digital preservation and data management good practice.
