
Children's Palliative Care Outcome Scale (C-POS)

What is this project for?

The C-POS study aims to develop a person-centred outcome measure that can be used by children, young people and families affected by life-limiting and life-threatening conditions. The study builds on existing international work and draws together a unique multidisciplinary collaboration to pioneer new methods for outcome measurement by a population currently neglected in research. The European Research Council has awarded funding for this project until early 2023.




The research team at the Cicely Saunders Institute at King's College London are currently working with the paediatric palliative care teams at Great Ormond Street Hospital, The Evelina Children's Hospital, The Royal Marsden and King's College Hospital. Interviews are underway with children and young people, siblings, parents/carers, healthcare professionals and commissioners to establish priorities for care which will inform the new measure before validation testing and implementation into routine practice.






New sites and ethics amendments:

We are opening at EACH, Addenbrookes, Martin House and LTHT which should help in recruiting more children so we can ensure their care priorities are accurately captured and included in the C-POS tool. We also have ethics approval so that non-palliative care clinicians can approach participants who have a life-limiting or life-threatening illness, as defined by Together For Short Lives, but are not under a palliative care team.





International progress:

Following the development of the paediatric POS tool in Africa, the C-POS study is currently recruiting in Turkey and Jordan.

Evelina London Children's Hospital (ELCH) has been involved in C-POS since the original workshops over 6 years ago. As a team we have been delighted with the enthusiasm of our families to get involved. The study is discussed weekly at our MDT to ensure that it remains in everyone's minds and to ensure we are considering all families as possible recruits. All members of the team are involved in the recruitment process. In light of our caseload, it is hard to recruit children and young people but the willingness of their parents to get involved, we suspect reflects the importance that they place in palliative care for their families and their desire to help shape services of the future.
