



Validation Study:


Recruitment to the validation study has been increasingly successful in the past few months. This is thanks to the incredible commitment of our partners and participating sites who keep introducing the study to their patients – thank you for all your work.

So far, a total of 301 participants have participated in the study, this includes 201 parents, 59 children and young people, and 41 health and social care professionals.



Our aim is to recruit 600 participants – so we are halfway there! We are excited to continue to work with you to reach that target in the new year now that a 6-month recruitment extension has been secured allowing us to continue recruitment until the end of June 2024:

Steering Group:

Our eighth steering group meeting was held on Monday 25th September 2023. This was a great opportunity for us to meet and discuss the progress on the project so far and gain feedback from our steering group members on how we can continue to improve recruitment to the ongoing validation study. We also presented the progress on phase three of the project investigating how best to implement C-POS into practice and presented our new study logo. We are grateful to all of those who attended and contributed.

Global Health and Palliative Care Project:

In September the team visited Kampala, Uganda to collaborate with researchers, clinicians, and children and young people working together as part

of the Global Health and Palliative Care (GHAP) project. Professor Julia Downing and Dr Eve Namisango have both previously undertaken work to develop and validate the first Person-Centred Outcome Measure for children with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions in sub-Saharan Africa. As part of this work, a number of challenges for developing outcome measures for this population were identified, including the need for different versions for different cognitive abilities, and difficulties in proxy reporting. The UK C-POS team faced similar challenges in the development and validation of the first Person-Centred Outcome Measure for children with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions in the UK and were invited to join the GHAP team in Uganda to share learning and strengthen the work on both measures. Additionally, Lucy Coombes and Professor Lorna Fraser joined Professor Julia Downing in presenting the GHAP webinar on Global Paediatric Palliative Care Research.



Publications:



Our original research article on achieving consensus on the priority items to include in outcome measures for children and young people with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions has recently been published online in the journal *Palliative Medicine*. We conducted a modified Delphi survey, worked with a young person's advisory group, and held an item generation meeting with key expert stakeholders. We found important differences in priority outcomes between children and young people,

parents and health and social care professionals. Health and social care professionals prioritised physical symptoms, whereas parents prioritised psychosocial and practical concerns. Children prioritised items related to living a 'normal life'. Five versions of C-POS have been developed that reflect the variation in age/developmental stages of children and young people with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions and allow for parent/carer proxy reporting if required.
