PEOPLE (mostly from the UK):

The list is endless and there are many well-known black activists and speakers all over the world. <u>Here is a list of just some from the UK</u>. Many of the authors of the books listed above are also influential activists, especially Akala (see him speaking on knife crime in the UK) and Afua Hirsch whose most recent piece on the protests can be read here.

- <u>Stuart Hall</u> was one of Britain's leading intellectuals, being at the foundation of the Centre for Contemporary Cultural Studies at the University of Birmingham. He was one of the foremost thinkers on race and ethnicity and an inspiration to a generation of academics.
- <u>George the Poet</u> is a British spoken-word artist, poet, rapper, and podcast host with an interest in social and political issues. <u>Here he is speaking on BBC Newsnight</u>.
- <u>Dave</u> is a young, black, British artist who regularly speaks about injustices in the UK. <u>Here he is</u> <u>live at the BRITS 2020</u>.
- <u>Stormzy</u> is a UK Grime Rapper, but he's also known for his <u>political activism and campaigning</u> <u>for black equality</u>.
- <u>Baratunde Thurston</u>, writer, activist and comedian. See his Ted talk on how to deconstruct racism one headline at a time.
