International Cross Disciplinary Symposium

Tuesday 1 November 2022

The Exchange, King's College London [Hybrid event]

A key objective of this symposium is to bring together researchers and practitioners from a range fields and institutions across Europe, to present and exchange findings emerging from interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary projects undertaken in collaboration and individually, over the last 2 years, at the intersections of art, the social sciences, ethnography, and clinical studies.

Involving the Universities of Agder (Norway), Turku University of Applied Science (Finland), The Aegean (Greece), Amsterdam, the Royal College of Music (Sweden), the University of West Attica (Greece), Trinity College Dublin (Global Brain Health Institute) and King's College London, as well as practitioners and arts organisations such as Arts Cabinet (London) and RAKETA (Sweden), this symposium will shed light on creative practices aligning embodied practice, arts for well-being, ethnographic practice, visual practice and cross disciplinary experimentation - to investigate the potential contribution of artistic methodologies in pedagogy.

In addition, the symposium provides a basis for questioning whether creative practices and their outputs can contribute to the common good, by stimulating potential for change and eventually effect policy.

We hope that this symposium will create the conditions for future encounters and collaborative projects that continue to expand knowledge about the potential that art, experimentation, and research can bring to the benefit of higher education and other communities.

The Moving Medicine workshop is a taster session of a workshop which has been used with medical students to explore, in a 'felt' sense, the ways in which movement emerges in healthcare contexts. This workshop will include some short experiential movement activities to music which participants are encouraged, but in no way obliged, to take part in. We invite participants to reflect on movement as a vital way of knowing, learning and communicating.

A longer version of this workshop has been delivered over the past couple of years to around 200 medical students at the University of Exeter Medical School as part of their Medical Humanities curriculum. We encourage participants to draw creative links between the movement activities, the body and healthcare. Themes that have emerged include stepping outside of your comfort zone; non-verbal communication; mirroring; movement in diagnosis and how 'medicine moves' e.g. rhythms in the body, rhythms in healthcare.
