01:14	Professor Diana Rose	Because if you don't understand what it's like to experience distress and be on the receiving end of mental health services, which by the way have got worse and worse in this country, then you won't understand mental health. You will be an outsider looking in. We will be objects that you're trying to understand rather than people with experiences that we have collectively thought about and codified.
01:40	Professor Craig Morgan	There's a very strong focus on our being able to use the knowledge that we've got to actually do something, to develop policies develop strategies for prevention and for intervention that can minimise the impacts of widespread social change and some of its negative consequences and so we can minimise the impacts of those on young people, on disadvantaged communities and in relation to work and welfare.
