Hybridity and Identity: Images from the Ecuadorian Andes Tuesday 2 October - Friday 19 October Photos by <u>Andrea Espinoza Carvajal</u>, PhD Researcher, Department of International Development. This exhibition aimed to show the diversity that constitutes the life of people in Llin Llin Pucará, an indigenous community in the Ecuadorian Andes. The twenty pictures presented in this exhibition were taken during fieldwork for the PhD thesis *Navigating through a plural-legal system. Indigenous women's access to justice in the Ecuadorian Andes*.

March - July 2018/ We are in Between'

A follow-up exhibition to 'Humans of Calais', documenting migrants' experiences since the demolition of the 'Jungle' refugee camp. This exhibition relayed, in text and still and moving image, some of the narratives of the migrants met by researchers from the Migration Research Group (Department of War Studies) in Calais and Dunkirk in September 2017.

15 December 2017 - 31 January 2018/Humans of Calais

A photographic exhibition exploring the experiences of migrants living in the 'Jungle' refugee camp in Calais, prior to its demolition in 2016. The researchers, Layla Mohseni, Signe Sofie Hansen, Tara Flores and Ishita Singh, from the King's College London Migration Research Group (Department of War Studies, School of Security Studies), collaborated with migrants in the camp to document the daily life of camp residents.
