- Required work experience or skills
- Programme-specific entry criteria i.e. UKCAT
- Research into the subject
- A genuine enthusiasm and curiosity for the subject and profession

Aptitude tests UKCAT

- A way of differentiating between a number of good candidates
- Required by 26 universities
- Taken between 3 July and 3
 October
- Focuses on cognitive powers and valuable attributes of healthcare professionals rather than curriculum or science content
- Each university uses differently



Aptitude tests UKCAT

Two hours - Five subtests

- Verbal Reasoning - 22 minutes 44 items
- Quantitative Reasoning - 25 minutes 36 items
- Abstract Reasoning - 14 minutes 55 items
- Decision Analysis 32 minutes 29 items
- Situational Judgement - 27 minutes 68 items
- Multiple-choice answers
- You can't revise but you should practice!
- Testing in July-October



UCAS Apply Personal statement

- Tell us what excites you about your chosen course
- Tailored to the the profession
- 4,000 characters



Personal statement What to include

- 75-90% relevant to academic pursuits in and outside of school/college
- Extended Project Qualifications
- Key skills and competencies
- Work experience or placements
- Relevant extra-curricular activities
- Any awards/achievements



Personal statement Work experience

- Any paid or voluntary experience in a care setting
- Work shadowing, for example with clinicians
- Evidence of insight into profession, and work in a clinical environment
- Specific examples where possible, one or two is sufficient




Work experience Logbook

- The context, where, what setting
- What you did, what you saw
- Specifics, granular detail, so the interviewer can imagine it happening
- Evaluation/reflection, what insight, how does knowing that give you an insight into become a Doctor



A competitive field Multiple Mini Interviews

- (MMI) Multiple mini interviews
- Short, timed assessments to score candidates on a range of criteria
- Candidates move around different stations in a carefully timed environment and under strict exam conditions
- Interviewers including King's academics, clinicians, students and service users




Be prepared for anything MMI examples

- 5-8 stations
- Usually 1-2 tasks per station, 5 to 7 minutes
- Understanding and motivation for the profession
- Case study
- Science knowledge
- Key values and qualities (NHS values), e.g. team work
- Communication, interpersonal skills



Evidence informed Why MMIs?

- 5 to 7 individual assessments making the overall assessment more reliable
- Cross section of views from persons across the profession e.g. surgeon, psychiatrist, researcher
- Reduces the risk of bias
- Mirrors the objective structured clinical examinations, the style of assessment students will be undertaking to assess clinical skills



Do your research
Preparing for the MMI

- Keep a log of any work experience, you can reflect on this
- Keep up to date with current affairs related to the profession
- Research the required skills and qualities, expand on these
- Note down examples, be specific
- Practise in advance with a friend or family member



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
Communication Question responses

- Take your time, there's plenty of it
- Ask if you need to have the question repeated
- Take notes on the question if it helps
- Succinct answers, focused on the question



Be ready On the day

- Dress should be appropriate for a professional setting, and comfortable
- Arrive in advance of the interview start time
- Follow the instructions given
- Bring a bottle of water
- Be friendly and personable to everyone



MMI examples

Example A:

Without using your hands, explain how to tie shoe laces.

Example B:

You're the captain of a team. Describe how you would tell squad members you didn't select them play. How would you do so?

Example C:

What are the essential qualities required to be a successful Doctor?



Be prepared for anything Our top three tips

- 1. Be prepared for likely questions and have questions to ask
- 2. Give full answers but don't memorise speeches
- 3. Be yourself!
