The Clinical Practice BSc at King's College London offers a flexible opportunity for qualified healthcare professionals to study for the degree qualification part-time. While there is no set timetable for the course, it must be completed within five years.

Course details

The course will provide you with knowledge and understanding of the following:

- Client assessment and clinical decision making in the context of a healthcare setting.
- Implementing, co-ordinating and evaluating a range of relevant therapeutic interventions.
- Research methods for healthcare.
- Promoting quality care by utilising and evaluating available evidence.
- Accountable practice in contemporary healthcare.
- National, organisational and local policies/guidelines shaping healthcare.
- Personal, professional, inter-professional, ethical and legal responsibilities.

Teaching

You can expect between 50 and 80 contact hours for each module of the study course, and this will include seminars, tutorials and workshops. Some areas of the course are designed to promote independent study supported by individual or group supervision, contact hours for these modules will be adjusted accordingly.

Assessment

We will assess your progress and attainment on all modules you take on the course through a range of techniques, which includes essays, portfolios, reports and dissertations. For the research based module there is an unseen written examination.

Regulating body

King's College London is regulated by the Office for Students.

Course structure

Courses are divided into modules. You will normally take modules totalling 120 credits.

Required modules

You are required to take the following module:

- Student Project (30 credits)

In addition, you are required to take one module from a range of optional modules, which may typically include:

- Research Methods (15 credits)
- Evidence Based Practice (15 credits)

Optional modules

You are required to take a further 75 credits from the undergraduate post-registration optional modules offered by the Faculty of Nursing,

Midwifery & Palliative Care that must be relevant to your working practice area.

The optional modules may typically include:

- Drug & Alcohol Misuse: Screening & Brief Interventions (15 credits)
- Contraception & Sexual Healthcare: A Foundation (15 credits)

- Haemato-oncology: Principles & Practice (15 credits)
- Neuromedical Conditions & Their Management (15 credits)
- Palliative Care & End of Life Care Symptom Management (15 credits)

- Nephrology Nursing (15 credits)
- Acute Oncology (15 credits)
- Child Protection (15 credits)
- Haemodialysis Nursing (15 credits)
- Neonatal Nursing: Special Care (15 credits)
- Diabetes Care: Theoretical & Practical Aspects (15 credits)
- Management in Healthcare (15 credits)
- Infection Control (15 credits)
- Cardiac Care: Heart Failure Assessment & Management (15 credits)
- ECG (15 credits)

Location

The course is primarily taught across four King's College London campuses. This includes three Thames-side campuses (Waterloo, St Thomas' and Guy's) and the Denmark Hill Campus in South London.

Full-time tuition fees – EU

Students starting their programme in 2019/20 (September 2019) who are eligible to pay EU fees will pay the same rate of tuition fees as UK students. This will apply for the duration of their programme but may be subject to change by the UK Government for subsequent cohorts from 2020/21.

Full-time tuition fees – International

The International tuition fees for the 2019–20 academic year are available on the course web page.

All International applicants to undergraduate programmes are required to pay a deposit of £2,000 against their first year's tuition fee. This deposit is payable when you firmly accept an unconditional offer to study with us, and will be offset against your tuition fees when you join King's.
