Our Australian Law LLB is an exciting course that allows you to fulfil the requirements of a qualifying law degree in England and Wales while also gaining knowledge about the Australian legal system. The first two years are spent at King's, year three is spent at a partner university in Australia and year four is spent back at King's. Selection for transfer is made after completion of the first year of LLB.

Course details

- Students on the Law LLB (M100) course may apply during their second year to transfer to this course. The English Law with Australian Law LLB is an exciting four-year degree course offering you a fantastic opportunity to spend one year studying law abroad at one of our partner universities in Australia.
- Our partner universities are currently:
 - Monash University, Melbourne
 - University of New South Wales, Sydney
- The course structure involves three years of study at King's (years 1 + 2 and year 4), while year 3 is spent abroad in Australia.
- The LLB degree is classified on the basis of the English degree results only, although students must pass the year abroad to be awarded the English Law with Australian Law LLB.

Teaching at King's

We have a strong tradition of excellence in teaching, with consistently high student satisfaction ratings for Law in the National Student Survey, and are committed to maintaining that tradition. All required modules are taught through lectures, small group tutorials and seminars. These tutorials and seminars will give you the opportunity to apply the general legal principles you have learnt to specific problems, and allow you to engage with our academics and explore issues further in depth.

You will be assigned a personal tutor, who will advise on academic and personal issues and offer some careers assistance. We attach great importance to maintaining good relations between staff and students and our Staff-Student Liaison Committee meets regularly.

Assessment at King's

Assessment of required modules will typically consist of an examination supplemented by written coursework, such as a written essay, where applicable. Assessment in optional modules varies and may encompass, for example, examinations, essays, moots, or a negotiation exercise.

Course structure

Courses are divided into modules. Each year you will normally take modules totalling 120 credits.

Year 1

Required modules

You are required to take the following modules for this course:

- Elements of the Law of Contract (30 credits)
- European Law (30 credits)
- Public Law (30 credits)
- Legal Reasoning and Legal Services (non-credit bearing)

Optional modules

There are no optional modules for this course in Year 1.

- Law of Trusts (30 credits)

Year 3

You will spend your third year in Australia at one of our partner universities. The LLB degree is classified on the basis of the English degree results only, although you must pass the year abroad to be awarded the English Law with Australian Law LLB.

Current regulations allow some students to pay UK tuition fees on the basis of their EU citizenship or residency. Until these eligibility criteria are changed, the EU tuition fee will remain the same as the UK tuition fee.

Please note that the tuition fees for subsequent

years of study may be subject to increases in line with King's terms and conditions.

All international applicants to undergraduate courses are required to pay a deposit of £2,000 against their first year's tuition fee. This deposit is payable when you firmly accept an unconditional offer to study with us and will be offset against your tuition fees when you join King's.

Additional costs

During your year abroad, at one of King's partner universities, you will not be charged tuition fees by the host university (although some partners do charge a small administration fee for applying).

King's will continue to invoice for a proportion of King's tuition fees. At present these are as follows:

- UK/EU students studying or working for a full academic year abroad will receive an invoice for £1,350 for King's tuition fees for the year.
- For international students studying or working for a full academic year abroad will receive an invoice for one third of King's tuition fees for the year.

You should also budget to pay for the associated subsistence costs, such as travel, visas, accommodation and food as well as any vaccination/immunisations required by the country to which you are travelling.

In addition to the costs above you can also expect to pay for:

- books if you choose to buy your own copies
- clothing for optional course related events and

competitions

- library fees and fines
- personal photocopies
- printing course handouts
- transcription costs
- society membership fees
- stationery
- travel costs for travel around London and between campuses
- graduation costs.
